

**DISCUSSION:** The applicant's Temporary Protected Status (TPS) was withdrawn by the Director, Nebraska Service Center. The case is now before the Administrative Appeals Office on appeal. The appeal will be dismissed.

The applicant is a native and citizen of El Salvador who is seeking Temporary Protected Status (TPS) under section 244 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (the Act), 8 U.S.C. §1254.

The record reflects that the applicant submitted an initial application for TPS on March 28, 2001. The application was approved on February 27, 2002. The director determined that the record of proceeding contains certified court documents (provided by the applicant and obtained by the Service) revealing that the applicant had been convicted in Colorado on July 24, 2001, on a charge of assault. The applicant was also convicted in Colorado on March 5, 2004, on a charge of assault. The director determined that the applicant had been convicted of two misdemeanors in the United States, and, therefore, denied the application.

The director may withdraw the status of an alien granted temporary protected status under section 244 of the Act at any time if it is determined that the alien failed without good cause to register with the Attorney General annually within thirty (30) days before the end of each 12-month period after the granting of TPS. 8 C.F.R. § 244.14.

On appeal, the applicant fails to make any statement or claim or provide any additional evidence.

An officer to whom an appeal is taken shall summarily dismiss any appeal when the party concerned fails to identify specifically any erroneous conclusion of law or statement of fact for the appeal. 8 C.F.R. § 103.3(a)(1)(v).

Inasmuch as the applicant has failed to identify specifically an erroneous conclusion of law or a statement of fact in this proceeding, the appeal must be summarily dismissed.

As always in these proceedings, the burden of proof rests solely with the applicant. Section 291 of the Act, 8 U.S.C. § 1361.

**ORDER:** The appeal is dismissed.
